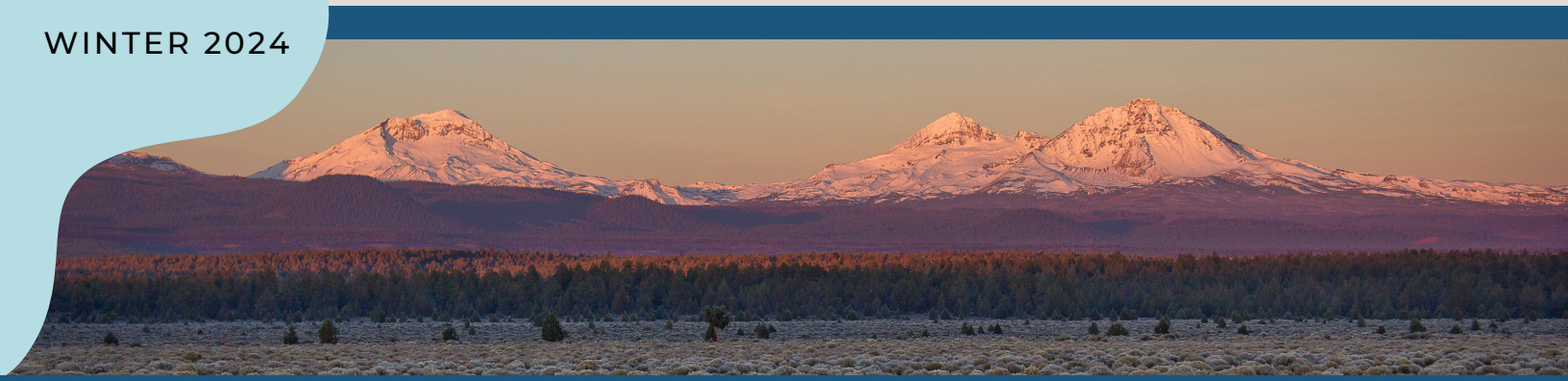

Climate Action Plan Update

In November 2022, President Chesley signed the [President's Climate Leadership Commitment \(PCLC\)](#), a nationwide strategy by which colleges work to decrease their carbon footprint. The PCLC initiative was established in 2006 and is currently managed by Second Nature, a non-profit organization that works "to accelerate climate action in, and through, higher education." Second Nature provides guidance, resources, and certifications to PCLC institutions.

The first step was to establish a [PCLC taskforce](#), which has been done under the college's 2023-27 Strategic Plan. The next step was to complete a greenhouse gas emissions (GhG) [inventory](#). Our next goal is to establish a climate action plan (CAP) that will guide the college toward carbon neutrality and outline actions to reduce emissions, which is almost complete! Watch for updates in the coming months with the announcement of the first COCC climate action plan.

Sustainability Curriculum

In 2019, in response to student and faculty interest, COCC approved two new sustainability course identifiers. The first is called the Sustainability Designation (SD) and it applies to courses with a “moderate to strong emphasis on sustainability” that have adopted at least one sustainability learning outcome. The second is the SUS prefix that applies to courses that are created with a specific and central focus on sustainability. SD and SUS courses may originate from any department. Overall, the SD and SUS course identifiers have been a success. COCC has approved seven SUS courses and 11 SD courses to date, and there are another 10 SD courses in the 2024-2025 curriculum workflow. In addition, a proposal has been made to allow the SD identifier to apply to single sections of multi-section courses (e.g., WR 121Z). Ponderosa Project

The Ponderosa Project workshop is coming to COCC in May of 2025! Based on a national model for faculty development and curricular innovation around sustainability, the workshop will feature two days of guest speakers, peer-to-peer discussions, deep thoughts, community-building, field trips, and experiential learning. Faculty participants will come out the other end with the knowledge, skills, inspiration, and support to incorporate sustainability into their existing courses or create new courses. The workshop will be offered to tenured, adjunct, and part-time faculty from all across campus. Participation in the workshop and subsequent sustainability curriculum development will be compensated by the COCC Strategic Plan, the Center for Advancing Faculty Excellence, and the Sustainability Committee. We are currently finalizing the workshop dates and location. Official announcements, invitations, and applications will be sent out in Winter term. Stay tuned!

Recycling

Everything we touch on the planet comes from somewhere and even after those things are out of our sight, they still exist in some form or another. Deschutes County's Knott Landfill is projected to be full by 2029. Keeping materials in their useful life cycle through "reduce, reuse, recycle" not only keeps materials out of landfills, but conserves natural resources by preventing the harvesting of new materials. Did you know?

To-go coffee cups, both paper and plastic, are not recyclable.

Please try to bring your own cup or bottle.

Common items that *cannot* be recycled are:

- Plastic bags
- Rigid plastic clamshells and hard plastics
- Polystyrene foam
- Waxed cardboard or frozen food boxes

Remember - When in doubt, leave it out.
